Sculpting success with the Arts Award

A small group of Year 8 Art students have been working with our artist in residence, Shamila Chady and Art department, once a fortnight, to develop and create a mural for display at the Academy. As part of this experience and because of the enthusiasm of the students involved, they were invited to join a trip as part of the FAB (Family Arts In Bilborough) project.

The visit to the Yorkshire Sculpture Park, which is just over an hour's drive away from Nottingham, gave students the opportunity to look at many exciting sculptures, both indoors and outside. The park grounds are very impressive with lots of walks and beautiful views. Students were supported by NUSA staff and Shamila to complete their Bronze Arts Award, in which the students passed on their skills using clay and other materials to Year 6 students from Firbeck and Melbury Primary schools.



Showing up is going up!

Nottingham City are working together with schools across Nottingham to improve attendance across the city. From September, we will be taking a tough stance on attendance and we will be introducing penalty notices and fines for persistent absence, lateness to school and holidays taking during term time.

However, we are also praising good and improving attendance. A 'prize lottery' for 100% attendance has been held every two weeks to win vouchers for Victoria Centre. Regular draws take place fortnightly giving everyone the opportunity to take part. A number of pupils were also rewarded for good or improving attendance with a day at Colwick Adventure Park. This saw pupils taking part in camp craft, climbing walls and boating on the lake. The pupils were amazing and nothing fazed them! Tracy Aldridge, Leanne Fletcher and Matt Colbourne also took part the activities and enjoyed spending time with pupils away from school. We will be continuing rewarding pupils next year for good attendance.



This year has also seen the introduction of the Lord Mayor's Attendance Awards celebrating good attendance across Nottingham City Schools. The event started with a visit from a leading counsellor to congratulate and present all pupils who have achieved 100% attendance with a certificate. We were then invited to attend a 'photo shoot' at the Council House in the Market Square which was to be the front cover of an Evening Post supplement celebrating Nottingham City Schools, at which Callum Dawkins (Year 8) represented NUSA. The end celebration was a special rewards afternoon at the Council House presented by the Lord Mayor. We are pleased to announce that NUSA had 2 winners that afternoon. Rachel Sims (Year 9) won an outstanding achievement award for excellent attendance and Jak Smith (Year 7) won an award from the Young Carer's association.

NUSA mean business

Over an eight week period, a group of NUSA students have taken part in weekly 'Business in Focus' workshops run by IntoUniversity. The group of lucky students have listened to engaging talks from accomplished professionals from the workplace. Speakers have included those working for 'Blue Chip' companies, franchise holders and local entrepreneurs based in Nottingham. In addition to analysing business structures, pupils have been keen to gain a grasp of the ethics, which surround business ownership.

The sessions themselves have seen students participate in dynamic and interactive business challenges. The activities have given students an insight into the world of work, whilst also offering them new transferable skills, to increase their employability.



Braving the Elements

On Thursday 10th July, the Year 10 GCSE Geography class visited the Yorkshire coast. They left the sun behind in Nottingham and braved wind and rain at Flamborough Head. Despite the weather, all of the students got stuck into their fieldwork and enjoyed the chance to see this dramatic coastline. They visited Mableton Sands as a comparison and to admire the power of the waves before returning to sunny Nottinghamshire to dry out!

Mrs Mizen, teacher of Geography at NUSA stated; "This trip was very important for the class as it contributed the essential fieldwork element of the GCSE specification. It also allowed the class to see coastal landforms first hand and this experience will help them to remember and understand these features. This will ultimately help improvement their exam success."

The Sky's the Limit for NUSA

NUSA students joined over 140,000 visitors including Prince Charles at RAF Fairford in Gloucestershire to attend the largest military airshow in the world, the Royal International Air Tattoo on Sunday 13th July.

They were treated to a performance by many of aviation's finest demonstrator pilots, performing manoeuvres at the edge of what modern military aircraft are capable of. One of the standout aircraft was the Alenia C-27J Spartan, which although a large transport plane, performed several rolls and a full loop.

Some of the other weapons on show included the F18 Hornet, the F16 Fighting Falcon, the Eurofighter Typhoon and the Russian cold war fighter plane the F22 Fitter, which the planes Mr Benjamin worked with would have been pitted against during the early eighties.

The Red Arrows also made an appearance marking their 50th year. They were joined over the Cotswold countryside by the leaders of four other teams appearing at RIAT: the Breitling Jet Team (L-39 Albatros); Frecce Tricolori (MB-339); Patrouille de France (Alpha Jet); and Patrouille Suisse (F-5E).

The Royal International Air Tattoo is a charity run by the Royal Air Force Charitable Trust, an organisation that funds many projects from providing ongoing care to injured Air Force personnel, to generating interest for the forces in young people.

Ten NUSA students attended the trip, with Year 10 student Ally Robson saying that "it was really fun and it was pretty good to see planes flying as well as seeing inside the plane we went in. It was also really cool to learn things about the planes." Cole Lakin, also a Year 10 student, was similarly enthusiastic, saying, "it was very busy and there were lots of aircraft to see. I personally found the Red Arrows really inspiring because they were all in sync, they took to the sky with perfection. Overall I thought the day was a great experience. We had the chance to meet lots of people, it was awesome and I enjoyed it a lot."



Animal Magic at the University of Nottingham

At the end of June, a few of our Year 8 students took part in a visit to the University of Nottingham School of Veterinary Medicine and Science. This was a great opportunity for the pupils, who spent time with the staff at the university, to learn about animal care and how we use animals.

They began the day learning about how to assess the health of a dog, using the university training dogs. Pupils were able to use stethoscopes to listen to the dogs' heartbeat, as well as using charts to assess weight. They then went on to learn about cows and sheep and were able to feed them: the animals were very gentle but the cows were eager to feed and happy to take control of the feeding buckets. Pupils were led to understand the products that we take from the animals.

Before the lunch break, students were allowed to visit the rabbit section that they had been keen to see, when they had passed the area earlier in the day.

The work has been followed up in lesson and letters of thanks to the university staff, who delivered the wonderful programme for the day, have been written. The pupils found the trip really enjoyable and have said that it was the best school trip that they have been on. A few students are now considering careers in animal care.

Head of English at NUSA, Miss Dixon said, "Trips are an important part of learning for our pupils, to develop their understanding of the world around them and how the skills they learn at school apply in real-life contexts. These opportunities are an invaluable asset to learning and we hope to create more in the future."



The Wiz wows at NUSA

Earlier this year, NUSA staff and students began rehearsing for Nottingham University Samworth Academy's first ever musical! 'The Wiz' is a retelling of the story of The Wonderful Wizard of Oz. The story follows Dorothy in her quest to return home to Kansas, but not before befriendng some interesting characters along the way. Catering Information for Year 6 Pupils Coming to NUSA

A few words about the catering facilities at NUSA, specifically aimed at the Year 6 pupils coming up into Year 7.

As you will have noticed during your transition days in June, we try to cater for most tastes and there are plenty of choices on a daily basis.

On the 'main meal' section of the counter you will find a daily changing main course together with a vegetarian alternative, as well as a dessert and a fruit salad alternative. Of course, some things in school you don't mess with and that means that Wednesday means 'Roast Day' and Friday means 'Fish Day'. By law(!) we are only allowed to use the deep fat fryer once a week and in my opinion fried chips taste better than oven chips, so the chips on Friday are "proper" chips! Examples of some of the main courses we've had on the menu since term started are: Cajun Chicken, Mince & Onion Pie, Madras Beef Curry, Pangasius Fillets in Szechuan Sauce, Smoked Haddock Fish Cakes, Sweet & Sour Chicken, Roast Topside, Roast Turkey and Roast Pork. Vegetarian dishes have included Mushroom Stroganoff, Stuffed Red Peppers, Vegetarian Lasagne and Quorn Balti. In line with our environmental and Eco-policy our suppliers are either local or regional where possible. Our fruit and vegetable supplier is local, most of our meat comes from a Derbyshire based butcher and the provenance of the meat is typically from within a thirty to thirty five mile radius of Nottingham. The poultry comes mainly from Lincolnshire and wherever possible our fish comes from sustainable sources.

I'd like to think that we don't serve 'typical' school meals at our Academy. We start from scratch every day and we don't skimp on either quality nor portion size. We don't buy ready-made sandwich fillings, we don't buy ready-made or frozen lasagnes and soup doesn't come out of a packet or a tin. I also personally have the hope that when our students leave the Academy that they do so with their palates as well as their minds enriched! I am sure that they will regularly see or taste food they've never had before but they should also know by now that they can always taste before they buy if they want to!

My aim at NUSA, is to do our catering equipment and facilities some justice by producing a great range of healthy, delicious and interesting food. However, getting rid of old favourites such as tuna/pasta pots and jacket potatoes just for the sake of change would be wrong so rest assured we will keep the popular choices unchanged where possible. The salad bar area has greatly improved (as has its popularity!) but the price for that was sacrificing some space allocated for the paninis, pizzas and jacket potatoes.

There is also the option to eat a free breakfast between 7.45 and 8.30 if you've run out of the house to catch the bus and skipped breakfast or if you just fancy a relaxed slice of toast or bowl of cereal before school.

We use a cashless catering system, where students add credit to their accounts which they then access at the restaurant using their finger prints. Accounts can be topped up by cheque, which they can deposit in the cheque box near the top-up machines on the ground floor, by cash (coins and notes) at one of three machine within the building or online. Parents can top up a student account online but we will let you know the ins and outs of how to top up in September. Cashless catering means that we do not accept cash at the tills at all and you can only buy food and drink when there is money in your account. The free school meal allowance is added to an account after mid-morning break and disappears after lunch if the allowance is left unused. You cannot accumulate free meal allowances.

Restaurant prices for the 2014-15 academic year will be confirmed and published on the schools website during the summer holiday.
